## *Moving Forward Together*

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### The United States Constitution

Article II, Section 1 of the U.S. Constitution imposes only three eligibility requirements on persons serving as president, based on the officeholder's age, time of residency in the U.S., and citizenship status:

### U.S. Constitution – Presidential Candidate Eligibility

"No person except a natural born Citizen, or a Citizen of the United States, at the time of the Adoption of this Constitution, shall be eligible to the Office of President; neither shall any person be eligible to that Office who shall not have attained to the Age of thirty-five Years, and been fourteen Years a Resident within the United States."

## The Foreign Propaganda Ban Act

*A Bill to prohibit U.S. corporations and government agencies from accepting or facilitating foreign government propaganda targeting the American people, and to protect national sovereignty over information.*

### Section 1. Short Title

This Act may be cited as the “**Foreign Propaganda Ban Act of 2025.**”

### Section 2. Findings and Purpose

#### Findings:

1. The Constitution of the United States guarantees free speech protections to the people, not to foreign governments.
2. Foreign governments have no constitutional standing under the First Amendment and cannot claim rights to use American platforms for propaganda.
3. Allowing foreign governments to purchase advertising or media influence campaigns targeting U.S. citizens undermines national security, weakens democracy, and erodes public trust.
4. U.S. corporations and government agencies that facilitate or profit from such propaganda betray the sovereignty of the American people.

#### Purpose:

The purpose of this Act is to:

- Prohibit foreign governments from purchasing or distributing propaganda through U.S. corporations.
- Hold corporations and government agencies accountable for serving as intermediaries of foreign influence.



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- Protect the American people's right to truth and sovereignty over information.

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### Section 3. Definitions

For the purposes of this Act:

1. **“Propaganda”** means any communication funded or directed by a foreign government or its agents with the intent to influence the beliefs, opinions, or actions of U.S. citizens.
2. **“Corporation”** means any business entity incorporated or operating within the United States, including subsidiaries of foreign-owned corporations.
3. **“Government agency”** means any federal, state, or local agency, department, or instrumentality.
4. **“Foreign government”** includes any foreign state, political subdivision, or entity acting on behalf of such government.

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### Section 4. Prohibition on Foreign Propaganda Contracts

1. No U.S. corporation or government agency may:
  - a. Accept payment from a foreign government to publish, distribute, or promote propaganda targeting U.S. citizens.
  - b. Act as an intermediary, subcontractor, or agent in facilitating propaganda on behalf of a foreign government.
2. Any contract, agreement, or arrangement in violation of this section shall be deemed **null and void**.

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### Section 5. Transparency Requirements

1. All corporations engaged in selling advertising, media, or communication services must maintain a **public disclosure dashboard** listing all attempted foreign government purchases of ad space, whether approved or rejected.
2. Government agencies must report to Congress on an annual basis any foreign government attempt to influence U.S. information platforms.



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## Section 6. Enforcement and Penalties

### 1. Civil Penalties:

- Corporations found in violation shall be fined not less than \$10,000,000 per violation or three times the value of the contract, whichever is greater.

### 2. Criminal Liability:

- Any executive or officer who knowingly authorizes such contracts shall be subject to imprisonment for up to 10 years.

### 3. Government Accountability:

- Any government official found to have knowingly facilitated foreign propaganda shall be immediately removed from office and permanently barred from holding public office.

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## Section 7. Whistleblower Protections

Employees of corporations or government agencies who expose violations of this Act shall receive full whistleblower protections, including immunity from retaliation and entitlement to a percentage of recovered penalties.

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## Section 8. Office of Information Sovereignty

- There is hereby established an **Office of Information Sovereignty** as an independent agency.
- The Office shall:
  - Audit corporations and government agencies for compliance.
  - Publish annual reports identifying violations.
  - Enforce penalties under this Act.

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## Section 9. Severability

If any provision of this Act is held unconstitutional, the remainder shall not be affected.
